5 The regular meeting of Council was called to order by Council President Kilbane at 7:00 p.m.

23 **COMMITTEE REPORTS**

24 COUNCILMAN MINEK said, Thank you, The Environment, Public Works, Planning, Zoning &
25 Development Committee met on Monday, October 26, 2015 to discuss the issue of sewers. Miss Dianne
26 Sumego, Project Manager/Client Director from Black & Veatch gave a presentation on the modeling
27 project, preliminary findings and preliminary recommendations. Also participating in the presentation
28 were all members of Council, Mayor Patton, Public Service/Development Director Berner, City Engineer
29 Michael Mackay and Miss Kim Kerber from Mackay Engineering, Matt Hrubey, Development Assistant
30 and many residents. Considerable discussion reference to the findings in our aging sewer system.
31 Questions were asked regard what can be done to alleviate flooding to our homes. The study was done
32 based on a five year storm. The recommended immediate improvements pertain to W. 229 St. W. 227 St.
33 and Clifford. Also W. 214 St., W. 215 St., W. 217 St. and Clifford. Residents from other areas of the city
34 inquired when will they see relief from flooding. All in attendance were advised that this is the first of
35 many future meetings with our patient residents. Any sewer renovation is very expensive. We will apply
36 for any grants which are available. Motion this issue remain in committee was approved 7-0. This
37 completes my report!

38
39 COUNCILMAN HINKEL said, The Local Government and Community Services Committee met on
40 Monday, October 26 to discuss Ordinance 15-40 addressing the fees at the Gemini Center. Fees will not
41 increase for about the 4th year in a row. The ordinance was placed on second reading and return to
42 committee with a 7-0 vote. There were two items requested by council for more information; an
43 amortization schedule which would give an idea of the year to year cost increase from 2015-2016 and a
44 request for a money in and money out schedule to be requested from the recreation Office Manager,
45 Mary Long. This was the only item on the agenda ad this ended the committee meeting.

46
47 COUNCILWOMAN CLEARY said, The Finance Committee met on Monday, October 26th to
48 discuss the following: **Ordinance 15-41** authorizes the Mayor to enter into a contract with the
49 Cuyahoga County Board of Health for public health services for 2016. Per the Ohio Revised Code, all
50 municipalities must provide health services offered through the city or through contract with the county
51 health district. The contract is not to exceed \$65,958 and will be charged to the General Fund.

52 Councilman McDonough inquired if the health department or our building department has dealt with the
53 issue of lead paint in residential properties in Fairview Park. The Finance Chair agreed to contact the
54 County Health Department and Building Commissioner to determine if Fairview Park, like many other
55 municipalities, has experienced an issue with lead paint in homes. A motion to place on 2nd and return to
56 committee carried 7-0. **Ordinance 15-42** adopts the new Chapter 174 of Fairview Park's Codified
57 Ordinance to comply with HB 5, mandating that municipal income tax codes be amended by January 1,
58 2016 to comply with the provisions and limitations outlined in Chapter 718 of the Ohio Revised Code.
59 Law Director Sara Fagnilli will be in attendance at the November 16th committee meeting to discuss the
60 changes and respond to any questions council may have regarding the ordinance. A motion to place on
61 2nd and return to committee carried 7-0. Ordinance 15-43 requests that the Cuyahoga County Fiscal
62 Officer certify the information to the city regarding the renewal of the one mill fire tax levy to be placed
63 on the March 16, 2016 ballot. This is a renewal levy for the fire department and the revenue from the
64 levy is used to fund operating expenses that include salary, benefits and pension payments pursuant to the
65 Ohio Revised Code. The renewal will be on property taxes collected in the years 2017 to 2021. A motion
66 to amend Ordinance 15-43 to correct the election date from March 16, 2016 to March 15, 2016 and
67 change the election from General to Primary carried 7-0. A motion to place on 2nd, subsequent 3rd
68 carried 7-0. **Resolution 15-26** submits to the voters the question of renewing the one mill fire levy,
69 originally passed on November 1996. The levy was renewed by Resolution 06-05, Amended for five
70 years and again by Resolution 11-15 for another five years. The revenue from this levy renewal will be
71 used to fund current expenses of the fire department including firefighter salaries and benefits. A motion
72 to amend Resolution 15-26 to correct the voter passage date for Resolution 11-15 from July 13 to
73 November 8, and in Section 2, change the election date from March 16, 2016 to March 15, 2016 carried
74 7-0. A motion to place on 2nd, subsequent 3rd carried 7-0. **Resolution 15-27** Authorizes the Mayor to
75 accept the funds donated from the Cleveland Clinic Foundation for the Safe Routes to Schools Program.
76 Development Administrator, Matt Hrubey was in attendance to report that the Cleveland Clinic
77 Foundation awarded to the city \$700.00 for the Fairview Park Safe Routes to School Committee to create
78 a safe environment of students to travel to and from school. Council acknowledged the ongoing and
79 successful efforts of Mr. Hrubey in securing grants submitted on behalf of the city. A motion to place on
80 2nd, subsequent 3rd carried 7-0. **Resolution 15-28** awards Active, Interim and Inactive Deposits for
81 2016. The following list of eligible institutions deemed suitable for business with the City of Fairview
82 Park include: Star Ohio; Key Bank, N.A. McDonald Investments; Charter One; Fifth Third Bank; and
83 Huntington Bank. This resolution allows the Finance Director some flexibility in depositing the city's
84 deposits where they can receive the highest permissible rate of interest. A motion to place on 2nd,
85 subsequent 3rd carried 6-0. City Council was in receipt of the most current job description for Finance
86 Director. Mayor Patton was in attendance to discuss the **qualifications for Finance Director** and
87 offered an explanation why the responsibilities for overseeing the IT contract and health care benefits are
88 listed in the job description. There was some concern expressed by council that oversight of those duties
89 fell to the Finance Director. The Mayor felt that the duties of the position allowed time for the additional
90 oversight duties and felt the city was not in a position to hire or contract for HR services. A motion to
91 remove the issue of Finance Director Qualifications from Committee carried 7-0. That concludes my
92 report.

222 **REPORTS AND COMMUNICATION FROM THE MAYOR, DIRECTORS, AND OTHER CITY**

223 **OFFICIALS**

224 MAYOR PATTON reported that Forward Fairview Park has set its goals for the coming year including:
225 engage the community, support existing Lorain Road business, attract new businesses and development,
226 make Lorain road more walkable and improve the appearance of the city's main street. The group will
227 reconvene in January. The city will place Christmas wreaths along Lorain Road from Story Road to West
228 229th Street. The Senior Center will be having the following activities in the next couple weeks: High
229 Seniors Helping Seniors on Wednesday, Nov 4, Senior Veterans Day and Luncheon event on Nov 11 and
230 a program at Gilles Sweet that evening at 7:00 p.m. Two cameras have been installed in police cars, and
231 training and computer hook up will take place in the next week or so. Campaign sign recycling will begin
232 on Wednesday and can be dropped off at city hall. The school district's danger of heroin meeting will be
233 held on Thursday, Nov 5 at Fairview High school. There will be two Fairview Park officers will be
234 participating in the panel. MAYOR PATTON announced that she will be participating at the Suburban
235 Water Council's meeting. Their new Director, Robert Davis will be inducted, and there will be
236 discussion on the Cleveland water rates and a tour of the Garrett Morgan Water Treatment Plant. City
237 Hall will be busy tomorrow with Election Day. Meals on Wheels will be having a bake sale in the
238 community room to raise funds for their program.

239

240 DIRECTOR BERNER reported that leaf pick-up season is going well and the daily schedule will posted
241 on the website a day in advance. He said that most neighborhoods and streets are compliant with not
242 putting leaves in the streets and blocking the storm sewers, but there are few exceptions that are
243 consistently disregarding this protocol. He reminded residents that they can be ticketed and asked that
244 they please comply. A new bucket truck was delivered last Friday and will be used by the tree trimming
245 crew. He encouraged council to take a look at our new investment. DIRECTOR BERNER announced
246 that there was a grand opening of the Maurice's store last Friday at Westgate and he and the mayor were
247 in attendance. They also met with the principals of Hospitality restaurants and discussed their plans for
248 relocating their corporate headquarters in Fairview Park. DIRECTOR BERNER thanked council and
249 everyone who attended the presentation by Black and Veatch on October 26 for the preliminary findings
250 of the sewer systems study. He will continue to provide periodic updates from the findings and
251 recommendations as we move forward. A request for proposals will be requested for field investigation
252 work for West 229th, West 227th and Clifford Drive. The proposals are expected to be received by Friday
253 and an award will be a given under the terms of Ordinance 14-67. A meeting will be requested with
254 council's Finance committee sometime after the start of the new year to discuss some of the different
255 options available for paying for some of the sewer programs and what we need to for 2016.

256 DIRECTOR CINGLE announced that monthly reports for the month of October will be distributed by the
257 end of the week. If there are any questions, please do not hesitate to ask.

258
259 DIRECTOR FAGNILLI reported that she will be in attendance at committee on Monday, Nov 9 to
260 discuss the new income tax Chapter 174, as a result of the House Bill 5 amendment. She encouraged
261 council to forward questions in advance if possible.

262
263 ENGINEER MACKAY reported that the work on the 2016 streets and 2016 water projects continue to be
264 worked on and he will keep council advised on them.

265
266 **PUBLIC SESSION**

267 MS. STACY DINGER – 4065 West 229th St – MS. DINGER spoke about her concerns about speeding
268 along her street. She said that her dog was hit and later died as a result of a speeding car. She said that
269 she has been there for 14 years and is constantly used as a cut through street. She said that there were
270 many people commenting on this incident on social media and that it is well known for speeding. She
271 said that she spoke to the Mayor’s Office, who referred her to the Police Chief who advised that there is a
272 speed tracker which uses stealth technology to monitor speeds and a speed trailer that can be used to look
273 at the problem. She is concerned that there could be an incident with a child if this is not addressed. She
274 hopes that this problem can be addressed, as it is a concern by many residents.

275 MAYOR PATTON thanked Ms. Dinger for coming out, and advised that the Police Department is
276 collecting data on the street right now and once they have all the data will be able to ticket residents.

277 COUNCILMAN MCDONOUGH said that there are basically two types of speeders in Fairview Park; the
278 one that doesn’t live here and is trying to get to the next street, and the other is the resident that is in their
279 own neighborhood. He said another potential option is a YOUR SPEED sign, which is a portable digital
280 unit that attaches to the speed limit sign to let drivers know how fast they are going. He said that studies
281 have shown that it is the best method of affecting driver behavior. He said he is happy to support
282 ticketing, and we could ticket our way out of a problem, but believes that this technology is cheaper than
283 the covert technology we currently have.

284
285 MS. DEB HAMMERLE – 22326 Haber Drive - MS. HAMMERLE said that after hearing about this
286 problem at council’s caucus and meeting tonight, she also wanted to comment on the speeding of drivers
287 down streets. She said that she was amazed at the speed of drivers even on streets free of traffic,
288 including commercial trucks and school busses with no effort to slow down. She was working 2 feet from
289 the curb and could feel the velocity of them as they drove by.



291 MR. RAY HAMMERLE – 22326 Haber Drive - MR. HAMMERLE said that he has mentioned the
292 speeding of the busses and drivers in the past. He said that the speed limit on most of the city streets is 25
293 miles per hour. He said that he was told previously that nothing can be done about it and that things have
294 changes, but he is hoping that it will continue to be something that is worked on.

295
296 **MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS AND COMMENTS BY MEMBERS OF COUNCIL**

297 COUNCILMAN MCDONOUGH said he wanted to spotlight Stefanec’s Barber Shop, which is a
298 business in Ward 1. They are located at 19227 Lorain Road and have been in business since 1969 and are
299 open six days a week. He said they have 4 wonderful barbers in the shop: Dave and Julia Stephanec, who
300 are second generation barbers and Bridget McGuire and Javier Torres. COUNCILMAN MCDONOUGH
301 encouraged anyone looking for a barbershop to visit them in Ward 1.

302
303 COUNCILMAN MINEK wished Councilman Hinkel the best in his election tomorrow.

304
305 COUNCILMAN HINKEL offered congratulations to the Fairview Park football team, who won their last
306 game 42-3. He encouraged everyone to get out and vote tomorrow.

324 MAYOR PATTON introduced the members of the Recreation Commission who were in attendance. She
325 thanked them for helping with the process of selecting the new Director.
326 MR. STEVEN OWENS introduced his family and thanked them for their support and everyone for the
327 appointment. He thanked the City of Cleveland for allowing him to serve since 2006. He said he has been
328 a public servant for most of his life and looks forward to seeing everyone at the Gemini Center. He plans
