#### **COMMITTEE REPORTS**

171 COUNCILMAN MCDONOUGH reported that the Local Government and Community Services  
172 Committee met on Monday, April 22nd at 7:00pm to discuss the **issue of Review of Charter and**  
173 **Codified Ordinances**. In attendance were members of council, Mayor Patton, Law Director Gibbons,  
174 Finance Director Cingle, Public Service and Economic Director Leininger and members of the Charter  
175 Review Commission.

176 The Charter Review Commission has recommended 6 charter amendments for Council's consideration.  
177 Discussion ensued regarding the recommendations. The committee voted 6-0 for this issue to remain in  
178 committee, so that additional research can be done with input from Clerk Westbrook and Law Director  
179 Gibbons. The committee meeting ended at 7:48 pm  
180

182 COUNCILMAN SMITH reported that the Finance Committee met on Monday, April 22nd, 2019 at 7:49  
183 pm. Present at the meeting were members of Council, Director of Public Service and Development Shawn  
184 Leininger, Finance Director Greg Cingle, and Mayor Patton. The following legislation was discussed:  
185 **Ordinance 19-20**, Authorizing Bids and Contracts for Lorain Road Streetscape Project. The project scope  
186 is comprised of streetscape improvements and repairs to Lorain Road from the western corporation limit  
187 to West 221 Street, including tree and shrub plantings; the installation of benches; restoration of tree lawn  
188 through concrete removal and installation of lawn and landscaped areas; sidewalk and apron repairs; and  
189 installation of landscaped islands (bump outs) to better define parking and reduce crosswalk lengths at  
190 intersections. The Ohio Department of Transportation ("ODOT") and Northeast Ohio Areawide  
191 Coordinating Agency ("NOACA") have committed funding to the Project in the amount of One Million  
192 Two Hundred Fifteen Thousand One Hundred and Seventy Six Dollars (\$1,215,176) through the  
193 Transportation Alternatives Program ("TAP") and Safe, Accountable, Flexible, Efficient Transportation  
194 Equity Act. The City of Fairview Park has committed the required Two Hundred Forty Thousand Dollars  
195 (\$240,000) for construction activities. The total estimated construction cost is One Million Two Hundred  
196 Seventy One Thousand Four Hundred Seventy Five Dollars (\$1,271,475) as determined by the design  
197 plans and specifications. This ordinance will allow the Director of Public Service and Development to  
198 advertise for and accept bids and the Mayor to enter into a contract with the lowest and best bidder as  
199 determined by the Board of Control in an amount not to exceed One Million Three Hundred Fifteen  
200 Thousand One Hundred Seventy Six Dollars (\$1,315,176), which includes a construction contingency not  
to exceed ten percent (10%) of the actual awarded contract price, to be paid from the Capital Projects

201 Fund (Fund 811). NOACA has requested the city to expedite the bidding so the contract can be awarded  
202 within the 2019 NOACA fiscal year that ends on June 30, 2019. A motion to pass on 2nd read emergency  
203 passed by a vote of 6-0. **Ordinance 19-21**, Authorizing Construction Administration and Inspection for  
204 Lorain Road Streetscape Project. As part of the Lorain Road Streetscape Project, ODOT procedures  
205 require that the City retain an ODOT pre-qualified consultant for construction administration and  
206 inspection services for the Project and the Board of Control shall adhere to and be in compliance with  
207 State of Ohio statute during its proposal evaluation and selection of a firm for the required services. This  
208 ordinance will allow the Mayor to execute an agreement for construction administration and inspection  
209 services for the Lorain Road Streetscape Project with an ODOT pre-qualified consultant as determined by  
210 the Board of Control for an amount not to exceed One Hundred Forty Thousand Dollars (\$140,000) to be  
211 paid from the Capital Projects Fund (811). This amount is included in the previously discussed Two  
212 Hundred Forty Thousand Dollars (\$240,000) for construction activities. This ordinance is directly related  
213 to ordinance 19-20 and NOACA has requested the city to expedite so the contract can be awarded within  
214 the 2019 NOACA fiscal year that ends on June 30, 2019. A motion to pass on 2nd read emergency passed  
215 by a vote of 6-0. **Ordinance 19-22**, Authorizing Bids and Contracts for Police Locker Room Renovation  
216 Project – Currently, there is not a designated women’s restroom or shower contained within the  
217 Department and female employees must utilize a converted closet as a makeshift locker room. The  
218 existing men’s locker room facilities have not been renovated or updated since their original construction  
219 in 1968. The City of Fairview Park has been awarded fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) from Cuyahoga  
220 County through the Community Development Supplemental Grant (“CDSG”) program to support the  
221 construction of women’s restroom, shower, and locker room. The total estimated construction cost for  
222 renovations to the men’s locker room and the addition of a women’s locker room is two hundred forty  
223 thousand dollars (\$240,000). This ordinance will allow the Director of Public Service and Development to  
224 advertise and accept bids for the Police Department Locker Room Renovation Project and the Mayor to  
225 enter into a contract with the lowest and best bidder as determined by the Board of Control in an amount  
226 not to exceed two hundred sixty-four thousand dollars (\$264,000), which includes a construction  
227 contingency not to exceed ten percent (10%) of the actual awarded contract amount, to be paid from the  
228 Permanent Improvement Fund (Fund 260). A motion to place on 2nd reading and subsequent third passed  
229 by a vote of 6-0. **Ordinance 19-23**, Authorizing Purchase of Computer Equipment & Software – As of  
230 January 2020, Microsoft will no longer provide support for its obsolete Windows 7 Operating System  
231 and/or Office 2010. Current users will no longer receive security updates as of that date leaving City  
232 computers vulnerable. The City of Fairview Park has begun the process of upgrading its outdated  
233 computer equipment and it is essential that utilized software is compatible with these upgrades. In  
234 addition, Microsoft Office programs used by City employees require yearly license renewals. Director  
235 Cingle obtained 3 quotes for the computer software and hardware upgrades. The cost of the computer  
236 equipment provided by SHI International Corp. would be seventeen thousand six hundred thirty four  
237 dollars (\$17,634.00) and would be paid from the Permanent Improvement Fund (260). The upgrades  
238 would cover the administration and city hall employees, Fire department, Senior Center and Gemini  
239 Center computers. Another ordinance will follow in the future for the Police department computers.  
240 Director Cingle said the consultants stated we should be able to get 5-7 years out of the software with  
241 purchase. Council asked whether it would be more beneficial to switch to a monthly subscription fee for  
242 online software and it was discussed that this may cost more in the long term and 5-7 years was a  
243 reasonable amount of time to get out of the software for the price of purchase. Council also asked whether  
244 some of the other computers should be updated at the same time and why some of the quotes had memory  
245 upgrades and some did not. Director Cingle stated he would ask the consultant and get back to council  
246 with answers. Discussion to continue. A motion to place on 2nd reading and return to committee passed  
247 by a vote of 6-0. **Ordinance 19-18**, Solid Waste Fee Special Assessment for Tax Years 2020 and 2021–  
248 Director Leininger prepared for council a detailed scenario of the cost of having the city return to  
249 collecting refuse. Council is very appreciative of all the hard work Director Leininger put into preparing  
250 this thorough report. The analysis estimated that if the city returned to collecting its own refuse the cost

251 would be approximately \$27.46 per household per month. Currently we are paying Republic Waste \$13.94  
252 per household per month and increasing 3% per year. Currently residents are paying \$10 per household  
253 per month. We will be paying approximately \$15.12 per month per household by the end of the current  
254 contract in 2021. Each year is an option that must be mutually agreed upon. It is unknown what the future  
255 price will be in the open market at the end of our current contract. As a comparison, a summary was  
256 provided to council of a contract recently entered into with the City of Brunswick and Republic Waste.  
257 The first year will cost approximately \$19.30 per household per month. It is believed this entire cost is  
258 paid by the residents. Currently the City of Fairview Park is subsidizing the difference in cost for the  
259 residents from the general fund amounting to \$283,524.00 this year and rising to \$368,578.00 in year  
260 2021. There were discussions about whether the fee to residents should be raised gradually now or a larger  
261 amount in the future, if needed. Discussions to continue. A motion to remain in committee passed by a  
262 vote of 6-0. **Ordinance 19-19**, Amending Section 929.06 Solid Waste Collection Charges Expiration Date  
263 – The Solid Waste Collection Charges are in effect through December 31, 2019. The amended date would  
264 take the expiration date to December 31, 2021. Discussions to continue. A motion to remain in committee  
265 passed by a vote of 6-0. The Finance committee ended at 8:53 pm.

387 **REPORTS AND COMMUNICATION FROM THE MAYOR, DIRECTORS, AND OTHER CITY**  
388 **OFFICIALS**

389 MAYOR PATTON reminded everyone that the first shredding and hazardous waste event for the city will  
390 be Saturday May 11 in the rear of city hall. She reported that the City of Fairview Park had the highest  
391 collections of all Western suburbs during the Drug Take Back event. The Fire Department has started its  
392 annual hydrant flushing and inspection will continue until completed. The Lorain Road Bridge protection  
393 Fence project began late last month and should be completed by late August. There will be some lane  
394 closures during the process. MAYOR PATTON reminded everyone about the annual Memorial Day  
395 ceremony which starts at city hall at 8am, followed by a parade down Lorain Road to the cemetery. The  
396 Nelson Russ Park ribbon cutting will take place on Thursday, May 16 at 6:00 pm. Recent NASA  
397 redevelopment site updates are that parking lot which was owned by Cleveland, has been sold to the site  
398 developer. This was a very important milestone in the project which will allow construction financing to  
399 move forward. Plans have been submitted to the Building Department and are on the docket of the

400 Planning and Design docket for their May 15. Gilles-Sweet's third grade classes will be at City Hall for  
401 their annual tour. Mayor Patton wished all mothers a Happy Mother's Day.

402

403 DIRECTOR LEININGER reported on the construction around the city which will be active throughout the  
404 summer; Clifford Drive has two crews working on the sewer replacement project. The sewer portions  
405 between West 227<sup>th</sup> and 229<sup>th</sup> streets are complete and repaving is now being done. On the portions of  
406 West 212<sup>th</sup> and West 220<sup>th</sup> crews have primarily been working between West 212<sup>th</sup> and W 215<sup>th</sup> streets.  
407 They are near complete with sewer work in that area, and will then focus on West 212<sup>th</sup> and West 215<sup>th</sup>,  
408 which will take several months to complete and finalize with repaving from West 212<sup>th</sup> to West 220<sup>th</sup>.  
409 The project is still on schedule to be completed by end of July or early August. The next two seasons on  
410 Mastick Road will be busy, starting with CEI closing the Mastick Road Hill between Eaton and Valley  
411 Parkway to replace a pole. The city will also be doing repair work while these closures are in place.  
412 Dominion Energy will also be kicking off a project this week, replacing a gas line along the entire length of  
413 Mastick Road to the North Olmstead Border to Eaton Road. This project will run to the middle to end of  
414 July. Following completion of this project, the County project of repaving Mastick Road will begin. There  
415 will be traffic closures down to one lane for this project and will run from July through November. The  
416 next project will be the rehabilitation of the Mastick Road Bridge, and more information will be available  
417 for that in the spring. DIRECTOR LEININGER reported that Nuevo Acapulco has opened and is doing  
418 very well. He congratulated them on a great start and welcomed them again to Fairview Park.

419

420 DIRECTOR CINGLE reported that Monthly reports for April have been distributed and asked that anyone  
421 with questions contact him. The 2018 continues and auditors are currently working offsite. The 2020 tax  
422 budget is being prepared and will be submitted for council's consideration at the next council meeting.

423

424 DIRECTOR GIBBONS congratulated the new patrol officer and said he was impressed with so many  
425 former and current and former patrol officers in attendance for her swearing-in ceremony. He said he  
426 believes that speaks highly of the police department. He also congratulated the Fairview Park high school  
427 athletes and he hopes it continues. DIRECTOR GIBBONS said that draft ordinances have been submitted  
428 for the six recommendations made by the Charter Commission. He said that it was a daunting task to try to  
429 convert the recommendations to legislation and ballot language and he was appreciative of the help of the  
430 Board of Elections, as they were to him as many communities do not enlist their help in the process.

431

432 ENGINEER MACKAY reported that the Campus/West 210<sup>th</sup> are being worked in and hopes that it will be  
433 ready for bid sometime this May. ODOT is working to complete plans for the Lorain Road slide project  
434 and he will keep everyone advised on the progress.

435

#### 436 **PUBLIC SESSION**

437 MR. JOHN TAYLOR – 22405 Macbeth Ave - MR. TAYLOR inquired about which city controls the  
438 traffic lights on Brookpark at the entrance of NASA. He said that the light used to flash during

439 DIRECTOR LEININGER replied that he believes it is the City of Cleveland.

440 MR. TAYLOR said that he travels this road often and remembers that the lights used to flash after certain  
441 hours in the evening and on the weekends. He was curious as to why they do not do this anymore. Mr.  
442 Taylor also inquired about the City's Service department being at a house on Macbeth, possibly working  
443 on sewers, during off hours and on the weekend.

444 DIRECTOR LEININGER replied that he would need to check in on this, but it would not be unusual for  
445 the city to get called in after hours for a blockage.

446 MR. TAYLOR said that he does not recall anyone every receiving service, especially during those hours,  
447 and that typically they would need to call a plumber. MR. TAYLOR asked about the lighting plan for the  
448 parking lot at Nelson Russ Park.

449 DIRECTOR LEININGER he has contacted CEI trying to coordinate with them, but it is low on their  
450 priority list to reenergize the light. He said the light by the pavilion is on.

451 MR. TAYLOR said that he hopes that the lighting that is present will help to let the police see cars in the  
452 park after hours and also deter other activities.

453

454 MS. RACHEL KILGORE – 4219 W 226<sup>th</sup> St – MS. KILGORE said that she wanted to share her safety  
455 concerns regarding Lorain Road. She said that the lane markers from West 210<sup>th</sup> along Lorain to the North  
456 Olmsted border are not visible at all and in driving in the dark and the rain impossible to see where the  
457 shifts occur.

458 MAYOR PATTON replied that the cross walks are being painted now, and we have contracted with a  
459 company to do the striping and we are supposed to be the first ones on the list. She explained that there  
460 needs to be a good 24 hours without rain and temperatures above 50 degrees to complete the striping.

461

462 **MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS AND COMMENTS BY MEMBERS OF COUNCIL**

463 COUNCILMAN MCDONOUGH welcomed new officer Amanda Hornblower and said that it was nice to  
464 recognize the various Fairview Warrior athletes and coaches. Also to Patrick O'Rourke for all of his  
465 contributions to St. Ignatius.

466

467 COUNCILMAN MINEK reported that the Board of Control will meet on Wednesday at 10:00 am to  
468 award the contract for the construction and administration of the Lorain Road Streetscape Project. The  
469 Board of Zoning and Building Appeals will meet next Monday at 7:00 p.m. with two docket items; 20952  
470 Belvidere Ave- requesting a variance to install an air conditioning unit; 4579 W 212 St.- requesting a  
471 variance to install a garage erecting a garage. The Planning and Zoning Commission will meet on May 15,  
472 2019 for the following docket items; 21405 Lorain Rd.- Review of plan for new construction; 21485  
473 Lorain Rd- review of plans for refuse storage and fencing; 21200 Brookpark & 21500 Brookpark Rd.-  
474 review of plans for signage, exterior renovations, new construction, parking facilities, and fencing.  
475 COUNCILMAN MINEK congratulated the students and coaches for a fabulous year and welcomed new  
476 officer Amanda Hornblower.

477

478 COUNCILWOMAN WERING welcomed new officer, Amanda Hornblower. She said that we had a room  
479 full of athletes which shows the city schools are doing something well, and it is appreciated. She thanked  
480 those in the audience that came to speak and be engaged.

481

482 COUNCILMAN RUSSO welcomed Officer Hornblower and said he appreciated the students coming  
483 tonight and thanked them for entertaining us at games during their seasons and bringing the community  
484 together. He asked Mayor Patton if she was still having a breakfast tomorrow.

485 MAYOR PATTON said yes, it is a Breakfast with the Seniors that she is invited to, and it starts at 9:30.

486 COUNCILMAN RUSSO said that he heard that he head that a lot of the reason the students are able to do  
487 better is because they have the Gemini Center practice play and participate in recreation teams, which all  
488 help and it's great that we have that facility.

489

490 COUNCILMAN SMITH announced that on Sunday, May 18 from 10am to 1pm the Fairview Shopping  
491 Center will be hosting its free Spring Fling event. He welcomed Nuevo Acapulco and said that they are  
492 doing a wonderful jib and are a great asset to the city. He also welcomed Fairview resident, Tanya Foose  
493 and her learning center to the city who just had a grand opening recently. COUNCILMAN SMITH also

WHEREAS, it has been determined that certain water mains on Campus Drive and West 210 Street between North Park Drive and Campus Drive are in need of replacement and/or extension; and

WHEREAS, the Fairview Park City School District has agreed to reimburse the City of Fairview Park for the extension of the Campus Drive water main to support a new fire suppression system serving the renovated middle and high school (Ordinance 18-48); and

WHEREAS on April 15, 2019, City Council approved Ordinance 19-24 repealing Ordinance 18-47 and authorizing the bid and award of a contract for the Campus Drive and West 210 Street Water Main Replacement an Extension Project in amount not to exceed the City Engineer's revised estimate of \$347,900; and

WHEREAS as authorized by Ordinance 19-24, bids were solicited and on May 10, 2019, an apparent lowest and best bid of \$376,325 was submitted; and

WHEREAS the apparent low bid does not exceed ten percent (10%) of the City Engineer's estimate and, in accordance with Section 153.12 of the Ohio Revised Code, a contract is therefore able to be awarded; and

WHEREAS, the City of Cleveland Water Division has indicated funding will be increased to the project to cover these additional costs.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FAIRVIEW PARK, COUNTY OF CUYAHOGA AND STATE OF OHIO:**

SECTION 1. That the funds for the Campus Drive and West 210<sup>th</sup> Street Water Main Replacement and Extension Project shall be appropriated from Fund 550 (Water Line Reconditioning) and shall not exceed \$376,325, an increase of \$28,425 from City Engineer's revised estimate of \$347,900 authorized by Ordinance 19-24.

SECTION 2. Funding for the Campus Drive and West 210<sup>th</sup> Street Water Main Replacement and Extension Project will be obtained from the City of Cleveland and the Fairview Park City Schools.

SECTION 3. It is found and determined that all formal actions of this council concerning and relating to the adoption of this ordinance were adopted in an open meeting of this council, and that all deliberations of this council and any of its committees that resulted in such formal action were in meetings open to the public in compliance with all legal requirements.

WHEREAS, it has been determined that certain water mains on Campus Drive and West 210 Street between North Park Drive and Campus Drive are in need of replacement and/or extension; and

WHEREAS, the Fairview Park City School District has agreed to reimburse the City of Fairview Park for the extension of the Campus Drive water main to support a new fire suppression system serving the renovated middle and high school (Ordinance 18-48); and

WHEREAS, on December 3, 2018, City Council approved Ordinance 18-52 authorizing the City Engineer to prepare plans and specifications and provide construction administration services for the Campus Drive and West 210 Street Water Main Replacement and Extension Project; and

WHEREAS, Ordinance 18-52 identified the City Engineer's not to exceed fee for such services as being \$43,000 and was based, in part, on replacing 877 lineal feet of water main as shown on the City of Cleveland Division of Water strip maps for the impacted area; and

WHEREAS, in preparing the plans and specifications and update of the City Engineer's estimate for the project it was discovered the actual lineal feet of water main to be replaced is 1,011 lineal feet; and

WHEREAS, the increased length of water main to be replaced required the City Engineer's estimate to be increased to \$347,900; and

WHEREAS, the City Engineer's not to exceed fee is based on the estimate to construct the project; and

WHEREAS, as a result of the increased water main to be replaced and increased project cost estimate, the City Engineer's revised not to exceed fee to prepare plans and specifications and provide construction services is \$48,226; and

WHEREAS, the City of Cleveland Water Division has indicated funding will be increased to the project to cover these additional costs.

SECTION 1. That the budget of the City of Fairview Park, Ohio, for the fiscal year beginning January 1, 2020, heretofore prepared by the Mayor, and submitted to this Council, copies of which have been and are on file in the office of the Director of Finance be and it is hereby adopted as the official budget of the City of Fairview Park, Ohio for the fiscal year beginning January 1, 2020.

SECTION 2. That the Clerk be, and is hereby authorized and directed to certify a copy of said budget, and a copy of this resolution, and to submit the same to the Cuyahoga County Fiscal Officer.

SECTION 3. It is found and determined that all formal actions of this Council concerning and relating to the adoption of this ordinance were adopted in an open meeting of this Council, and that all deliberations of this Council and any of its committees that resulted in such formal action were in meetings open to the public in compliance with all legal requirements.

SECTION 4. That this Resolution is hereby declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, safety and welfare and for the, further reason that it may be certified to the Cuyahoga County Fiscal Officer by date prescribed by law; and provided it receives the affirmative vote of a majority plus one of the members elected to Council, it shall take effect and be in force from immediately upon its passage and approval by the Mayor, otherwise from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

## COUNTY OF CUYAHOGA

### **Background**

Substitute House Bill No. 129 (HB129) effective June 3, 2002, was enacted by the 124th General Assembly in part to allow a county budget commission to waive the requirement that a taxing authority adopt a tax budget for a political subdivision or other taxing unit, pursuant to Ohio Revised Code (ORC) Section 5705.281.

### **Ohio Revised Code Section 5705.281**

Under the amended version of this section pursuant to HB 129, a county budget commission, by an affirmative vote of a majority of the commission, including an affirmative vote by the county auditor, may waive the tax budget for any subdivision or other taxing unit. However, the commission may require the taxing authority to provide any information needed by the commission to perform its duties, including the division of the tax rates as provided under ORC Section 5705.04.

### **County Budget Commission Duties**

The county budget commission must still certify tax rates to each subdivision or other taxing unit, by March 1 for school districts and by September 1 for all other taxing authorities under ORC Section 5705.35, even when a tax budget is waived. Also, the commission is still required to issue an official certificate of estimated resources under ORC Section 5705.35 and amended official certificates of estimated resources under ORC Section 5705.36.

Therefore, when a budget commission is setting tax rates based on a taxing unit's need, for purposes of ORC Sections 5705.32, 5705.34, and 5705.341, its determination must be based on that other information the commission asked the taxing authority to provide under ORC Section 5705.281, when the tax budget was waived. Also, an official certificate must be based on that other information the commission asked the taxing authority to provide.

### **County Budget Commission Action**

On October 11, 2002, during the Cuyahoga County Budget Commission meeting, the commission with an affirmative vote of all members waived the requirement for taxing authorities of subdivisions or other taxing units (Including Schools) to adopt a tax budget as provided under ORC Section 5705.281, but shall require the filing of this Alternative Tax Budget Information document on an annual basis.

### **Alternative Tax Budget Information Filing Deadline**

For all political subdivisions excluding school districts, the fiscal officer must file one copy of this document with the County Fiscal Officer on or before July 20th. For school districts the fiscal officer must file one copy of this document with the County Fiscal Officer on or before January 20th.
