

2020 MVT'S

W 204. **Ash** tree. This tree was chosen because it survived and avoided the devastating Emerald ash borer, that infected and killed so many trees in our city. This tree not only survived but thrived. The nomination was made by Kerry Sullivan, resident and homeowner.



W 217 St. Grand old **Silver Maple**. “A favorite for my grandchildren. They head right to it when they arrived and they all loved climbing it. The tree provided many years of family memories, documented with photos.” Nominated by Glenda Seyfarth, resident, homeowner and grandmother.


